

## **GAME ON**

It's the new APF Floor Game available for Youth Corners at Australian National Shows. Well it's the back really! It is quite huge and needs lots of floor space. The latest of the APF floor games, it was very kindly donated by the Canberra Philatelic Council. The Show's Organizing Committee can request the use of this game from the APF Youth Development Officer. After the Show it's sent back to the APF.

In this game, you throw the large Dice and take the number of moves to a square showing the task you have to undertake. Land on this square and you have to do the following task.



Landing on this square means you can collect a stamp for your collection - well done!

The APF Floor Game is based on the board game "Snakes and Ladders".

This game has quite an interesting history. It is believed to be based on an ancient Indian board game played between two or more players on a game board having numbered, gridded squares. A number of "ladders" and "snakes" (or "chutes") are pictured on the board, each connecting two



board squares. The object of the game is to navigate one's game piece from the start (bottom square) to the finish (Top Square), helped or hindered by ladders and snakes, respectively.

The traditional version is based on morality lessons, where a player's progression up the board represents a life journey complicated by virtues (ladders) and vices (snakes). Originally the number of ladders was less than the number of snakes as a reminder that treading a good path is more difficult than treading a sinful path! Errk!

Such moral ideals lead to a version sold as Snakes and Ladders in Victorian England in 1892. In 1943 Milton Bradley introduced the game in the United States as Chutes and Ladders.

#### The APF Youth Development Program

This program aims at giving young people lots of fun with philately. State Youth Officers look after programs in their State. The APF Youth Development Officer helps them by providing resources including the Young Collector magazine and the Big Floor Game.



# **DRAGONS**

Adragon is a mythical creature, typically with snakelike or other lizard like traits that feature in the myths of many cultures.

There are two distinct cultural traditions of dragons:

First the European dragon, derived from European folk traditions and related to Greek and Middle Eastern mythologies, The European dragons are more often winged as shown in the stamps of Iceland and Wales.





The winged dragon has long been a symbol of Wales. The winged dragon was first seen in Wales in Roman times. Possibly the Romans were thought to have gained knowledge of the dragon from their Parthian enemies (in lands later to become part of the great Persian Empire)

The English word "dragon" comes from the Greek "dragon, serpent of huge size"



Although dragons occur in many legends around the world, different cultures have varying stories about monsters that have been grouped together under the dragon label. Some dragons are said to breathe fire or to be poisonous. They are commonly portrayed as reptilian, hatching from eggs and possessing typically scaly or feathered bodies.

The Chinese dragon is similar in Japan, Korea and other East Asian countries where they all resemble large snakes.



The earliest depiction of the oriental dragon was the Chinese dragon with examples dating back to the 16th century BC. It is said that the Chinese word for dragon is an imitation of the sound thunder makes, and is pronounced "lóng" or "lùhng"

Dragons are considered lucky and can even bring rain, and are particularly popular in China where the five-clawed dragon was a symbol of the Chinese emperors.

The Dragon Dance with the Dragon costume manipulated on poles by several people is a common sight at Chinese festivals.

The Dragon is one of the 12-year cycle of animals which appear in the Chinese zodiac related to the Chinese calendar, and the only animal that is legendary.

People born in the Year of the Dragon are said to be honest, sensitive, and brave.
