
An exciting new concept has been initiated by the Victorian Philatelic Council in conjunction with the APF – downloadable stamp albums.

The children attending the show had fun collecting their stamps for there Australia 2013 Passports















Soaking Stamps

Hi. I'm Latty from the Philately Gang and I am here to talk to you about soaking stamps the right way. Equipment you will need;

- 1. Two plastic containers (ice-cream containers are fine but make sure you wash them well first.)
- 2. Paper towels, or tea towels, to soak up the water from the stamps.
- 3. Scissors.
- 4. Stamps on paper.
- 5. Stamp press to flatten stamps when dry.
- You need to decide which envelopes you would like to keep.
 - a These might include nice postmarks.
 - b An example of your favourite stamp being used on a cover.
 - c Slogan cancels.

- 2 The envelopes with the stamps that you want to include in your album will need to be prepared for soaking.
 - a Cut the stamps roughly from the envelope using round-nose scissors.
 - b Trim the paper around the stamp to about half a centimetre (5mm).
 - c Separate the stamps into three piles; "OK", Self-adhesive" and "Care needed*" (*This will include stamps on pink, red, green, blue or other strongly coloured paper as the colour might run.)

Care Needed

- 3 Now we are ready to soak the stamps.
 - a Get your two plastic containers and ask a grownup to help you fill them about halfway; one with warm water and the other with cold water.
 - b Place the stamps from the OK pile into the warm water but not more than 30 stamps at a time.
 - c Leave the stamps to soak for around 15 to 20 minutes.
 - d After the time has finished the stamps will begin to float away from the backing paper.

- 4 Peel 'n' stick or self-adhesive stamps
 - a Follow steps 1 and 2.
 - The water needs to be a bit warmer.
 - The stamps will need to soak for longer as the gum is harder to remove.
- 5 Stamps that need extra care (coloured paper)
 - a Follow steps 1 and 2 with a few exceptions.
 - b Place the stamps face up in the water so they float. (you do not want water getting on to the stamps)
 - c Float no more than five stamps at a time because if the colour starts to run you will need to remove the stamps quickly.




- 6 Rinsing and drying your stamps
 - a As the stamps float off the trimmed paper place them in the cold water.
 - b Remove the stamps from the cold water and place them face down on the paper towel, tea towel or in a drying book.
 - c Some stamps will curl while drying.
 - Once they are completely dry they will need to be put between two sheets of paper with something heavy placed on top, like a telephone book.
 - e After the stamps have been completely dried and pressed they will be ready to place in your stamp album or stock sheet.







Special stamp drying books are a great way to dry your stamps.



Don't forget to ask your family and friends to pass on their old envelopes.
